The Three Robes of Jesus JD Cash

Once there was a city-man who was pulled over by a deputy sheriff of a small town and ticketed for running a stop sign. The man later stormed into the sheriff's office and loudly protested that he was unfairly treated. "I have driven through this town every week for the past twenty years and the sign was not there. Then, suddenly it appears and I'm ticketed! I demand to see the Mayor of this town!"

The sheriff, who was behind his desk, simply reached and turned his desk sign around. It now showed him to be the, "Mayor of the Town." The driver was outraged and sputtered, "This will never stand up in court! I want to see the county judge!"

Suddenly, the Mayor swept his sign into a desk-drawer. From the drawer he withdrew a mallet and a black robe. He stood up, wrapped himself in the robe, pounded the gavel and declared, "Court is now in session."

Of course, that's just a story, but it is not fiction that Jesus holds the three offices of prophet, priest, and king. All three of these offices were "anointed," that is, inaugurated by a sacred ceremony in which oil was poured over the head of the man who was to fill the office. References are made to "anointed priests" going about their sacrificial duties at the altar (Leviticus 4). Even kings couldn't do what priests did. When Uzziah, the anointed king went into the temple to offer incense on the altar, Azariah the priest went in after him, with eighty priests of the LORD who were men of valor; they withstood King Uzziah, and said to him, "It is not for you, Uzziah, to burn incense to the LORD, but for the priests the sons of Aaron, who are consecrated to burn incense. Go out of the sanctuary; for you have done wrong, and it will bring you no honor from the LORD God" (2 Chronicles 26:1).

Not so with Jesus who was born to be King (John 18:37) and who is the apostle and high priest whom we confess (Hebrews 3:1, 2). Peter applied this statement of Moses to Jesus: God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people... (Acts 3:19-26). As our Prophet, He takes the words of God and presents them to man. As our priest, He takes our sacrifice (Himself the Lamb) and offers His blood before God (Hebrews 9:11-14). As our king, He commands our lives and executes His will through us toward man. With honor, He seamlessly and all at once, wears the robes of each office, never taking off one to put on the other. Once in a synagogue, Jesus read from Isaiah, "The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me... Then, with every eye in the synagogue fastened on him he declared: Today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing" (Luke 4 18-21).

New Safety and Security Procedures

The men of the congregation have put the following procedures in place to further the safety and security of each member.

For 6:00 AM worship service, all doors should be locked, with the exception of one front glass door in the front by 6:15.

All doors should be locked by 9:35 on Sunday mornings for classes, with the exception of two rear doors, and two front doors.

All doors should be locked by 10:35 on Sunday mornings for worship services, with the exception of one front glass door.

All doors should be locked on Wednesday evenings for Bible Study, and classes by 7:05, with the exception of one front glass door.

During our Gospel Meetings, devotionals, and any other such events, all doors are to be locked, with the exception of one front glass door, after a five minute allowance has expired for late arrivals.

If someone leaves the building during class, or worship service, they should be escorted by a Safety Team member.

Once worship service, Bible study, and or classes are over, two Safety Team members should dispatch themselves to the parking areas. One to the front parking area, and the other to the rear parking area.

In order to help those who used to park in the rear, or are running late, all parking areas are open to anyone, anywhere on property after 6:15, 9:35, and 10:35 on Sunday mornings, 5:05 on Sunday evenings, and 7:05 on Wednesday evenings to include handicap, and or visitor parking as formerly unlocked doors will now be locked sooner.

We can adjust these times, or change this policy as events occur, or as is deemed necessary, or appropriate in the future.
